## An annual global event reaching far and wide across the planet.


- Almost 50,000 entries into the competition from photographers across over 100 countries

## Exhibitions of the 100 winning images travel the globe on a hugely popular global tour.

- The photographs cover a wide range of subjects, including underwater photography, animal behaviour and wildlife photojournalism
- Each image captures a riveting story resulting from months or even years of painstaking research
- All photographs are accompanied by detailed captions bringing each shot to life in vivid detail while addressing current issues around biodiversity and climate change

The exhibition features a number of categories that vary depending on the competition entries. Recent categories examples are:

#### **Young Photographers**

Features remarkable photography from the youngest winners in the competition, divided into 10 Years and Under, 11–14 Years Old, 15–17 Years Old.

#### **Behaviours**

Showcases the funny, ferocious and captivating behaviours of creatures across the animal kingdom.

#### **Habitats**

Captures the magic of the commonplace, or the surprise of the unexpected across distinct habitats.

#### Photojournalism

Investigates the relationship between humans and the natural world, with images that illustrate how our attitudes, decisions and actions impact our planet.

#### **Rising Star**

Provides a platform for promising photographers at the start of their careers, bringing their images to shine on the global stage.

#### **Portfolio**


Open to photographers aged 27 and over, these are a selection of one photographer's best work, a portfolio that focuses on a personal passion or represents a creative and unique approach.



## The exhibition is available to hire in two formats: Light Panel and Dibond.

### **Light panel format** 500sgm/5400sgft

- The images are printed on Duratran material (a special translucent-base film) and are displayed on LED back-lit customdesigned panels.
- The light is diffused evenly throughout the entire Duratran prints bringing the images to life with superb clarity and maximum colour saturation and contrast.



Dibond format


300sqm/3200sqft

- The images are printed on C-Type (chromogenic) photographic paper and mounted to panels made up of two sheets of lightweight aluminium composite material and a solid polyethylene core.
- Dibond panels offer a compact and lightweight solution combined with high colour quality and vividness.

#### **Light Panel format**

This format requires approximately 500sqm/5,400sqft and includes:

- High quality Duratran prints of the 100 winning images
- LED backlit panels for display of the images (82 LED light boxes: 1000mm x 1000mm; 5 LED light boxes: 1450mm x 1450mm)
- English captions printed within the Duratrans.
- Full exhibition text and design files for local printing of information panels and for translations

#### Dibonds format

This format requires approximately 300sqm/3,200sqft and includes:

- High quality Dibonds of the 100 winning images (82 single images: 600mm x (variable on image ratio); 2 grand title winners panels: 920mm x (variable on image ratio); 3 multi-image panels: 920mm x 665 mm)
- For English language venues: detailed captions and information panels printed on sturdy forex
- For non-English-language venues: full text and design files for translations and printing of information panels and captions

### Both versions of the exhibition also include:

- A detailed toolkit specifying hanging and other technical details
- A selection of optional digital content to enhance the visitor experience
- Gallery soundscape
- Extensive Marketing, Social Media and Press toolkits and supporting materials
